OVERVIEW OF COMPLIANCE MONITORING SCHEME MATTERS FOR TCC15

WCPFC-TCC15-2019-08A
17 September 2019

Paper prepared by the Secretariat

Purpose

1. The paper provides an overview of the WCPFC online reporting systems that support the Compliance Monitoring Scheme and includes some observations from the Secretariat on this year's draft CMR. There are four related papers that cover the specific topics of:
 - a. List of Capacity Assistance Requests and Capacity Development Plan (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-08B);
 - b. Summary Tables of Flag CCM responses to alleged infringements notified in the WCPFC online compliance case file system 2019 - revision 1 (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-dCMR02_rev1);
 - c. Update on submission of Annual Report Part 1 and Part 2 (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-IP01); and
 - d. Streamlining WCPFC Reporting Requirements Discussion Paper (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-10)

2. TCC15 is invited to consider this paper together with the above four related papers on Compliance Monitoring Scheme matters and as appropriate, make necessary recommendations to WCPFC16.

Background

3. The Commission has been implementing the WCPFC Compliance Monitoring Scheme since 2011. Its current purpose is described in paragraphs 1 and 2 of CMM 2018-07 *Conservation and Management Measure for the Compliance Monitoring Scheme*, as follows:
 1. *The purpose of the WCPFC Compliance Monitoring Scheme (CMS) is to ensure that Members, Cooperating Non-Members and Participating Territories (CCMs) implement and comply with obligations arising under the Convention and conservation and management measures (CMMs) adopted by the Commission. The purpose of the CMS is also to assess flag CCM action in relation to alleged violations by its vessels, not to assess compliance by individual vessels.*

2. *The CMS is designed to:*
- (i) *assess CCMs' compliance with their WCPFC obligations;*
 - (ii) *identify areas in which technical assistance or capacity building may be needed to assist CCMs to attain compliance;*
 - (iii) *identify aspects of CMMs which may require refinement or amendment for effective implementation;*
 - (iv) *respond to non-compliance by CCMs through remedial and/or preventative options that include a range of possible responses that take account of the reason for and degree, the severity, consequences and frequency of non-compliance, as may be necessary and appropriate to promote compliance with CMMs and other Commission obligations¹;*
and
 - (v) *monitor and resolve outstanding instances of non-compliance by CCMs with their WCPFC obligations.*

Footnote 1: In accordance with the process for identifying corrective action, as provided for in paragraph 45(vi).

4. The Compliance Monitoring Scheme was reviewed by Members during 2017 and 2018.¹ In April 2017, an Independent Panel was appointed and the final report from the Panel was issued on 7 March 2018 for consideration by Members (TCC14-2018-10C). At WCPFC14 (2017), the Commission established an Intersessional Working Group on the Review of the Compliance Monitoring Scheme (CMS IWG) to facilitate consideration of the Report from the Independent Review of the CMS and develop a proposed CMM for the Compliance Monitoring Scheme for consideration at WCPFC15 (2018). At WCPFC15 the Commission agreed to CMM 2018-07 and paragraph 47 states that “this measure shall be enhanced in 2019 in accordance with the future work in Section IX” and paragraph 48 says that the measure will be effective for 2019 only.

5. The future work set out in Section IX of CMM 2018-07 was intended to be a collective effort to continue to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the Compliance Monitoring Scheme (as required by CMM 2018-07 paragraph 45 and TCC Workplan 2019 - 2021 priority project specific tasks). Two of the Section IX Future Work tasks were progressed during the intersessional period as follows:

- i) *“CMM 2018-07 paragraph 45 (iii) the development of audit points to clarify the Commission obligations assessed under the CMS, as well as the development of a checklist to be used by the proponents of any proposal to include a list of potential audit points for the consideration of the Commission;”*

15 May: Federated States of Micronesia expressed their desire to lead the work envisaged by the Commission at its WCPFC15 meeting for members to collaborate during the intersessional period in 2019 to develop draft audit points for the assessment of obligations through the Compliance Monitoring Scheme *via WCPFC Circular 2019/28*. The letter also sought nominations of points of contact to participate in the intersessional discussions.

- ii) *CMM 2018-07 paragraph 45 (ii) a comprehensive review of all the Commission's reporting requirements, with recommendations to remove duplicative reporting as well as ensure the Commission's data and information needs are met;*

22 July: The Secretariat circulated *via WCPFC Circular 2019/36* a discussion paper prepared by the Secretariat that reviews all the annual reporting requirements of the Commission with the view to streamline them and to avoid or minimize duplicative reporting. The Discussion Paper was noted to be a work in progress and to assist with finalizing the paper for TCC15, the Secretariat requested that CCMs and Observers provided comments no later than 28 August 2019. The Discussion Paper was also tabled at SC15 for input from SC participants, and particularly on science-related issues within the paper (SC15-2019 ST-WP06).

6. The TCC15 provisional agenda presently includes the above two future work tasks, as well as the other CMM 2018-07 paragraph 45 items and the TCC Workplan 2019 - 2021 priority project specific tasks.

2019 CCM Annual Reports and draft CMR submissions

7. Key dates for CCM annual reporting, draft CMRs and the associated WCPFC online systems in 2019 were as follows:

- i. **6 February:** Fish/did not fish template (CMM 2017-05 09) sent out to CCMs, which is more than five (5) months in advance of the reporting deadline of 1 July;
- ii. **5 March:** *2019 Suggested Checklist for Reporting Requirements and Annual Report Part 1 updated template* was published to WCPFC website;
- iii. **29 March:** Annual Report Part 2 online system was made available for CCMs use, which is four (4) months in advance of the reporting deadline of 1 July. (Notification to CCMs was via *WCPFC Circular 2019/19* and this included a 28-page quick guide to assist CCMs with completing Annual Report Part 2, Managing Compliance Cases, and previous year Flag State Investigation scores. CCMs were also advised that a list of significant dates, which includes key reporting deadlines, is accessible and exportable through the calendar on the website. CCMs were advised of additional 2017 and new 2018 alleged infringements based on ROP observer data that had been included in the online Compliance Case file system work had commenced to upload supporting documentation for this year's draft CMR on the secure side of the WCPFC website CCM portals);
- iv. **1 July:** Deadline for Annual Report Part 2 and Fish/did not fish template submissions (CMM 2017-05 09);
- v. **13 July:** Deadline for Annual Report Part 1 submissions;
- vi. **2 August:** The Secretariat issued draft CMRs for thirty-six (36) CCMs and one collective group of Members for individual CCM review. The online system for CMR was updated by the Secretariat considering the WCPFC15 agreed list of obligations and the requirements of CMM 2018-07. CCMs were advised of additional 2017 and new 2018 alleged infringements based on ROP observer data

that had been included in the online Compliance Case file system. In accordance with CMM 2018-07 paragraph 26 (ii), CCMs were also advised that Summary tables of flag CCM responses to alleged infringements notified in the WCPFC online Compliance Case file system had also been issued with the draft CMR (TCC15-2019-dCMR02). (Notification to CCMs was via *WCPFC Circular 2019/41* - which included a 23-page quick guide to assist CCMs with submitting replies to the draft CMR online and Managing Compliance Cases);

- vii. **28 August:** The cut-off date for CCM replies to their draft CMR, if the CCM would like their responses to be considered in the full draft CMR (refer to *CMM 2018-07 para 28*);
- viii. **10 September:** The full draft CMR was made available for all CCMs review, in advance of TCC15. (Notification to CCMs was via *WCPFC Circular 2019/41*) The Secretariat will separately post any additional CCM replies received on the draft CMR prior to the start of TCC15 (refer to *CMM 2018-07 para 33*); and
- ix. **17 September:** A revision 1 of the paper indicating the range of cases and information held by the Secretariat and recording of the responses from flag CCMs was also issued for the information of CCMs on the secure pages of the WCPFC website (TCC15-2019-dCMR02_rev1)). (refer to *CMM 2018-07 para 29*).

8. One of the key inputs to the Compliance Monitoring Scheme since its implementation has been the draft CMR which the Secretariat is tasked to prepare and issue around late July/early August each year. In the early years of CMS implementation (2011 -2013), the scope of the draft CMR was a compilation of information received through Part 1 and 2 Annual Reports, other reporting obligations, the transshipment program, the regional observer program, the Vessel Monitoring System and any other data collection programs of the Commission.

9. Since 2014, the scope of the draft CMR was expanded to what was contained in paragraph 22 of CMM 2017-07:

“22. Prior to the annual meeting of the TCC, the Executive Director shall prepare a Draft Compliance Monitoring Report (the Draft Report) that consists of individual draft Compliance Monitoring Reports (dCMRs) concerning each CCM and a section concerning collective obligations arising from the Convention or CMMs related to fishing activities managed under the Convention. Each dCMR shall reflect information relating to the relevant CCM’s implementation of obligations as reflected in paragraph 3 or modified by paragraph 15, as well as any potential compliance issues, where appropriate. Such information shall be sourced from reports submitted by CCMs as required in CMMs and other Commission obligations, such as Parts 1 and 2 of the Annual Reports as well as information available to the Commission through other data collection programs, including but not limited to, high seas transshipment reports, regional observer program data and information, Vessel Monitoring System information, High Seas Boarding and Inspection Scheme reports, and charter notifications; and where appropriate, any additional suitably documented information regarding compliance during the previous calendar year. The Draft

Report shall present all available information relating to each CCM's implementation of obligations for compliance review by TCC.”

10. In CMM 2018-07 the scope of the draft CMR now states as follows...

“22. Prior to the annual meeting of the TCC, the Executive Director shall prepare a Draft Compliance Monitoring Report (the Draft Report) that consists of individual draft Compliance Monitoring Reports (dCMRs) concerning each CCM and a section concerning collective obligations arising from the Convention or CMMs related to fishing activities managed under the Convention.

23. Each dCMR shall reflect information relating to the relevant CCM's implementation of obligations as identified under paragraph 6 as well as any potential compliance issues, where appropriate. Such information shall be sourced from reports submitted by CCMs as required in CMMs and other Commission obligations, such as:

i information available to the Commission through data collection programmes, including but not limited to, high seas transshipment reports, Regional Observer Programme data and information, Vessel Monitoring System information, High Seas Boarding and Inspection Scheme reports, and charter notifications;

ii information contained in an Annual Report which is not available through other means; and

iii where appropriate, any additional suitably documented information regarding compliance during the previous calendar year.

24. The Draft Report shall present all available information relating to each CCM's implementation of obligations for compliance review by TCC.”

11. In response to the scope of the draft CMR, the breadth and depth of analysis undertaken by the Secretariat in preparation of draft CMRs has been expected to incrementally expand over the years of implementing the Compliance Monitoring Scheme. The Secretariat's response to the draft CMR task, has included careful work planning and efforts to build and enhance WCPFC IMS hosted databases for centralizing records of CMM reporting and development of integrated MCS analytical tools at the Secretariat.

12. Table 1 below provides as a comparison, the key statistics related to each year's draft CMR report. Annex II provides the list of the CMM paragraphs and Convention provisions which were agreed by WCPFC15 to be included in the full draft CMR.

WCPFC Online Reporting Systems used to support the Compliance Monitoring Scheme

13. As has been the case since 2013, the WCPFC Compliance Monitoring Scheme continues to be supported by the WCPFC online reporting systems.

14. In 2019, the WCPFC online reporting systems used to support the Compliance Monitoring Scheme was comprised of seven (7) lists that are hosted on the WCPFC Intranet using a Microsoft Sharepoint web application platform:

- i. **Annual Reports Part 2 (RY 2018):** All CCMs are required to submit an Annual Report Part 2 to the Commission (187 questions);
- ii. **Addressing CMR-2017 Issues:** This list is part of the 2019 Annual Report Part 2 and was relevant to only those CCMs who had a score of “Non-Compliant”, “Priority Non-Compliant”, or “Capacity Assistance Needed” in the Final CMR Report adopted by WCPFC15. CMM 2018-07 paragraph 44 says: “*Each CCM shall include, in its Part II Annual Report, any actions it has taken to address non-compliance identified in the Compliance Monitoring Report from previous years.*”
- iii. **Flag State Investigation Issues:** This list is part of the 2019 Annual Report Part 2 facility to assist Flag CCMs in providing responses to scores of “Flag State Investigation” in the Final CMR Report adopted by WCPFC15. This facility allowed CCMs to provide reports on the status of investigations that are ongoing related to 2015 - 2017 alleged infringements.
- iv. **MTU Audit Inspections:** This list is relevant to CMM 2014-02 9a VMS SSPs 7.2.2 and CMM 2014-02 9a VMS SSPs 7.2.4 (Annual Report (RY 2017) Q-101 and/or Q-102). All CCMs that answered “YES” to one or both of these questions in Annual Report Part 2 should have completed this section. This list can be accessed by CCMs throughout the year, and is not time-limited;
- v. **01-July-2019 Reporting Deadline Checklist:** The checklist is designed as a tool to allow CCMs to confirm to the Secretariat that they have completed one or more of the relevant annual reporting online lists for Annual Report Part 2. It also reminded CCMs about CMM 2017-05 paragraph 9 reporting requirement (Fished/Did Not Fish report) which was also due on 1 July 2019, and which is an important report for draft CMR reviews;
- vi. **WCPFC Online Compliance Case File system:** This system is to track individual alleged violations and flag CCM responses (for further details please refer to WCPFC-TCC15-2019-dCMR02_rev1); and
- vii. **Compliance Monitoring Reports (2018):** The template was based on the WCPFC11 agreed template and CMM 2018-07 (Annex I provides the template for 2019 draft Compliance Monitoring Report). CCM reported information that is completed in the online reporting system for Annual Report Part 2 (YES/NO/not applicable and any explanations) and online reporting system for submitting replies to the draft CMR, assists the Secretariat with accurately transferring the CCM reported information into the full Compliance Monitoring Report (2018). The Compliance Monitoring Report template (2018) also collates information CCMs have submitted as part of draft CMR

replies of Capacity Development Plans as stipulated under CMM 2018-07 paragraphs 14 - 15.

15. **Annex I** to this paper provides the template for 2019 draft Compliance Monitoring Report. **Annex II** to this paper provides the list of CMM paragraphs that were included in the 2018 draft CMR. The list of Annual Report Part 2 2019 questions can be found in Annex 1 of Streamlining WCPFC Reporting Requirements Discussion Paper (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-10).

16. In 2019, the Secretariat has also continued the practice of using the individual CCM portal page on the secure side of the WCPFC website (each CCM has access to their own CCM portal, and not that of others) to facilitate the dissemination of additional supporting information relevant to draft CMRs. As in past years, the Secretariat commenced posting supporting information relevant to draft CMR in March 2019 (WCPFC Circular 2019/19).

17. The successful delivery of the WCPFC online systems continue to be a result of the combined efforts of the WCPFC Secretariat Compliance and IT staff, IMS contractor Taz-E P/L and website contractor Eighty Options. The Secretariat also acknowledges the contribution of SPC-OFP colleagues in 2018/2019 who continued to provide considerable assistance to the Secretariat so that ROP-data could continue to be used to support the online Compliance Case File system.

WCPFC Compliance Monitoring Scheme outcomes by applicable CCMs under the Compliance Monitoring Scheme (CMS) 2013-2018




Figure 1 Summary of WCPFC Compliance Monitoring Report Outcomes 2013-2018**

18. In 2018, the Secretariat gave some consideration to alternative means of conveying the outcomes from the Compliance Monitoring Scheme. The ‘spider chart’ presented in Figure 1 below, which is based on a similar graphic used in IOTC, is one such initiative that was explored by the Secretariat. The chart summarises the result of evaluations of the obligations under the CMS since 2013 (covering reporting year 2012 (RY2012) to RY 2017)). This spider chart represents the proportion of applicable CCMs which were scored as having fully implemented an obligation in the final CMR for each of the relevant obligations included in the category. “Fully Implemented” means the score for a CCM for the obligation that was not Flag State Investigation, Capacity Assistance Needed, Non-Compliant nor Priority Non-compliant. Figure 1 shows a general trend of improvement over time in implementation by applicable CCMs with the various groups of obligations included in the categories of obligations as evaluated by the Commission in the Compliance Monitoring Scheme. For example, there were general improvements over time by applicable CCMs in the outcomes from the Compliance Monitoring Scheme for transshipment-related obligations, Record of Fishing Vessels and Scientific Data decision. There has been some improvement, but applicable CCMs are facing ongoing challenges in meeting other reporting obligations including deadlines.

19. In each of this year’s regular Annual Report on MCS programmes (WCPFC-TCC15-2019-RP01 – RP06), the Secretariat has again included topic specific spider charts to demonstrate trends in the outcomes from the Compliance Monitoring Scheme.

****The % value shown is an average of the proportion of applicable CCMs which were assessed to have “fully implemented” the group of obligations within that category across the final CMR scores e.g. 100% = in that reporting year, all CCMs to whom the relevant group of obligations within that category were applicable, were assessed by the Compliance Monitoring Scheme to have fully implemented the obligations. The proportion of these scores amongst the applicable CCMs may differ amongst the various obligations within that category e.g. some obligations could have 100% compliant scores for applicable CCMs and others could include 30%). The obligations were for: Record of Authorized Vessels: CMM 2009-01, CMM 2014-03, CMM 2013-10 and CMM 2013-03; Vessel Monitoring System: CMM 2007-02 and CMM 2014-02; Observers: includes coverage requirements in CMM 2007-01 and other CMMs; Transshipment: 2009-06; Implementation: Various obligations that involve CCMs undertaking implementation (CMM 2013-05, CMM 2006-08) Catch and effort limits: includes most CMR section (i) requirements where there is a clear catch, effort and/or capacity limit; FAD: FAD provisions - generally from the tropical tuna CMM and includes both reporting and FAD use restrictions; Annual Reporting: Submission of Annual Report Part 1 and Annual Report Part 2 (not included in RY 2012); Scientific data: Decision on scientific data submission obligations; Other: All reporting (CMR section vii) and other reporting requirements in various CMMs.**

Secretariat Observations

20. The Secretariat makes the following observations on the Compliance Monitoring Scheme:
- a. In 2018, the compliance case file system has continued to expand with additional Article 25(2) and updated ROP data covering 2016/18 periods;
 - b. The preparation and posting to CCM portals of WCPFC VMS reporting supporting files related to 2017/19 has improved the communications between the Secretariat and relevant flag CCMs regarding the VMS reporting status for their vessels;
 - c. The content and depth of analysis undertaken by the Secretariat in preparation of draft CMRs has been maintained and was supported by previous years and ongoing investments by the Commission in the development and enhancement of the WCPFC IMS hosted databases for CMM reporting at the Secretariat and the development of the WCPFC online reporting systems;
 - d. In response to the tasks in CMM 2018-07, and its earlier iterations, the Secretariat MCS/compliance staff carefully structure and manage their work program and timelines during the period of late April through the end of September, to meet the specified draft CMR deadlines and TCC annual meeting commitments and deadlines;
 - e. The Commission continuing its practice of approving a list of obligations to be assessed under CMR (WCPFC15 Summary Report Attachment V) assisted tremendously the Secretariat with maintaining: (i) early issuance of the online Annual Report Part 2 system for CCMs (4 months in advance of the deadline); (ii) providing notes to remind CCMs of the obligations that will be reviewed in the draft CMR in a particular year in AR Pt 2 template; (iii), its own internal preparations of the online systems for Compliance Monitoring Report development; and (iv) forward planning the investigation of analytical approaches and scheduling the development of IT tools needed to support draft CMR preparations;
 - f. The additional efforts that many CCMs have made to continue earlier annual report submissions has been appreciated by the Secretariat and in 2019 continued to assist the Secretariat with meeting the draft CMR issuance deadline in CMM 2018-07 (see *WCPFC-TCC15-2019-IP01_rev1*);
 - g. Looking towards to 2020 and onward, the Compliance Monitoring Scheme-related tasks for the Secretariat will be dependent on the outcome of the CMS Future Work and the related-TCC workplan priority tasks, noting that CMM 2018-07 paragraph 47 says that the CMM on CMS shall be enhanced in 2019 and paragraph 48 says that the measure will be effective for 2019; and
 - h. All general Annual Report Part 2 and draft CMR inquiries and requests for assistance should be copied to the email address: contact.ar@wcpfc.int.
